REIMBURSEMENT RATES FOR SCHOOL PROGRAMS EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2011 - JUNE 30, 2012

NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

For Each Lunch Served:	Less Than 60%	60% or More
To students paying the full price	\$.26	\$.28
To students eligible for reduced price	\$2.37	\$2.39
To students eligible for free	\$2.77	\$2.79
USDA Foods value (formerly USDA Commodities)	\$.2225	\$.2225
Annual State matching payment for school year (2010-2011) Approximately 4.12 cents times the number of lunches served to students in the previous year.	\$.0412	\$.0412

NOTES:

- USDA regulations require that the reduced price charge to students not exceed **40 cents** for lunch.
- If 60% or more of the student lunches served in the second preceding school year (2009-2010) were served free or at a reduced price, the reimbursement is an additional 2 cents per lunch.
- The state matching payment is not made to residential child care institutions, or Wisconsin Technical College System schools.

SCHOOL BREAKFAST PROGRAM

For Each Breakfast Served:	Non-severe Need	Severe Need
To students paying the full price	\$.27	\$.27
To students eligible for reduced price	\$1.21	\$1.50
To students eligible for free	\$1.51	\$1.80
** Annual State breakfast aid for school year (2010-2011). Based on the number of breakfasts served to students in the previous year, to the extent funds are available.	\$.1145	\$.1145

NOTES:

- USDA regulations require that the reduced price charge to students not exceed **30 cents** for breakfast.
- A school is eligible for **severe need reimbursement** if 40 percent or more of the student lunches served at the school in the second preceding school year (2009-2010) were served free or at a reduced price. Severe need payment is made on an individual school building basis. Regulations require documentation of eligibility to be maintained on file by the school agency for periodic review. Severe Need Breakfast request submission and approval is part of the annual DPI-SNT online contract renewal.
- The state breakfast aid payment is not made to 2R charter schools, state-run schools, residential child care institutions, or Wisconsin Technical College System schools.

** The above are actual breakfast aid rates for the 2010-2011 school year. Due to a 10 percent decrease of state breakfast aid in the 2011-13 biennial budget appropriation, it is anticipated that this rate will be further reduced. Breakfast aid payments for school year 2011-2012 will be determined sometime after October 2011.

SPECIAL MILK PROGRAM

Schools may elect to operate the Special Milk Program as either a pricing or nonpricing program.

Under a pricing program:

Schools may choose either **option 1** or **option 2**:

Option 1:

Students eligible for free meals receive free milk, all other students pay the established half pint charge.

- For each half pint of milk served to students paying established charge \$0.2050
- For each half pint of milk served free to free eligible students..... Average Net Dairy Cost

Option 2:

All students pay established half pint charge (no free milk).

- For each half pint of milk served to students \$0.2050

Under a nonpricing program:

The school policy is to provide milk free of charge to all students.

- For each half pint of milk served to students \$0.2050

NOTES:

- There are no regulations covering the number of half pints of milk that may be served to students. If you serve portion sizes other than half pints, reimbursement is still based on actual half pint equivalents served. There are 16 half pints in a gallon.
- Under a pricing program, the reimbursement rate must be used to the extent possible to lower the charge to paying students.
- USDA regulations require that the Special Milk Program be made available only to students who do not have access to the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) or School Breakfast Program (SBP). If schools do participate in the NSLP or the SBP, they may offer milk under the Special Milk Program to part-day students, such as split-session kindergarten and pre-kindergarten students, only if those students do not have access to the NSLP or SBP.

AFTERSCHOOL SNACKS SERVED IN AFTERSCHOOL CARE PROGRAMS

Paid	\$.07
Reduced price	\$.38
Free	\$.76

NOTES:

- If charging for snacks, USDA regulations require that the reduced price charge to students must not exceed **15 cents** for afterschool snack.
- An afterschool care program site is “**area eligible**” if it is located at a school or in the attendance area of a school where at least 50 percent of the enrolled children are eligible for free or reduced price meals. All snacks served in afterschool care programs that are “**area eligible**” are reimbursed at the free rate.
- Snacks served in afterschool care programs that are not area eligible are reimbursed at the free, reduced price, and paid rate depending on each individual’s eligibility for free or reduced price meals.
